CHANG: Edward Chang for the People. 8 MR. BELBAHRI: Saleem Belbahri with Mr. Vincent who is 9 present in court in custody. Requesting appointment on his 10 behalf. Is Austin Vincent your true name, sir? 11 THE COURT: 12 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, ma'am. 13 THE COURT: Can you afford to hire an attorney to 14 represent you? 15 THE DEFENDANT: No. 16 THE COURT: I find you eligible for appointed counsel. 17 I do want you to be aware that at the end of the case, 18 there may be a determination made about whether you have the 19 ability to pay for your own attorney's cost, and you may be 20 required to pay if you have the resources. 21 Do you understand that? 22 THE DEFENDANT: Absolutely understood. 23 THE COURT: I will appoint the Public Defender's Office 24 to represent you. 25 Mr. Belbahri, do you accept the appointment? 26 MR. BELBAHRI: I do, Your Honor. 27 Waive instruction on arraignment. Enter pleas of not 28 guilty. Reserve the right to demur. Make an ongoing motion

for discovery.

I would ask to be heard as to Mr. Vincent's custodial status.

THE COURT: So I will hear from you, Mr. Belbahri. I received my PSAs late today. I have reviewed the PSA, but I wanted to take a quick look at the police report, and then I'll give you my full attention.

MR. BELBAHRI: Sure.

(Off the record.)

THE COURT: I have read the police report.

I'm ready to hear your argument.

MR. BELBAHRI: Thank you, Your Honor.

Your Honor, I would ask the Court to consider releasing Mr. Vincent with a CASC referral in this case. I think that would be appropriate given some of the circumstances.

I don't believe Mr. Vincent is a flight risk nor a threat to public safety. Mr. Vincent has no prior failures to appear on his record. It's reflected by the PSA.

He's been in the Bay Area now for three years. I do have a contact number for his family member, who I will be able to contact Mr. Vincent through, as well as a mailing address of his family member.

Mr. Vincent, I don't believe, is a threat to public safety. I do understand the Court's likely concern with this type of incident. I think that this is a case that, with a protective order in place, would be able to alleviate any of the Court's concerns of public safety.

Mr. Vincent has no prior convictions involving

violence. All of his convictions are minor and misdemeanor convictions from New York mostly involving larceny, petty theft.

I think it's clear from the facts of this case that Mr. Vincent was at a point of crisis and was at the front door of someone's apartment building and, according to the police report, trying to enter that apartment building.

The alleged victim in this case didn't note any -Mr. Vincent having any type of weapons. There were no -there weren't specific threats made by Mr. Vincent.
Mr. Vincent was telling this person that there's a robot
inside, that he was basically trying to help save this
person.

So I think a CASC referral would be able to connect Mr. Vincent with some of the services that he obviously needs. There's nothing on his record that indicates any type of similar behavior of any sort.

THE COURT: I mean, the police report also indicates that Mr. Vincent, you know, told her -- told the victim to give her -- him her car keys, give me your phone, give me your wallet, give me anything you have. I don't think it was just a -- the allegation at least is not that it was simply a moment of crisis but also a robbery.

MR. BELBAHRI: I read those facts, Your Honor, but also the complaining witness does say that he was shouting -- excuse me -- the security guard says that Mr. Vincent was shouting at the complaining witness in this case. He called the desk attendant a robot. He approached the door and

tried to prevent the complaining witness from entering the building. He told her he was trying to save her.

So I think it's pretty clear that we do have someone that was at a point of crisis and needs some assistance. don't think that keeping him in custody until the preliminary hearing would help him get the assistance that he obviously needs.

THE COURT: What are the People requesting?

MR. CHANG: Your Honor, along the lines of the Court's concerns, we are concerned about the public safety aspect.

Looking at the rap, counsel is correct, most of the things are from New York and are petty larceny. There is one misdemeanor, menacing a weapon.

So we are going to consider that in addition to the rap.

THE COURT: How old is that one?

MR. CHANG: That one, I believe, is 2014.

To the defendant's credit, there haven't been anything -- any other convictions since 2014 until now, but not to his credit are the facts of the case.

I'm not discounting the fact that defendant might be -might have been at a point of crisis, but there is enough
evidence to show that he's a public safety risk.

So we agree with the PSA.

MR. BELBAHRI: Your Honor, would it be possible to have Mr. Vincent fitted with a GPS monitor to stay away from this location?

THE COURT: Yeah, I want to ask you about his ability

to -- I know sometimes when folks are in an unstable housing situation, it can be very difficult to keep a monitor charged, and then they're sort of escalating consequences for failing to do that because then folks end up back in custody, and we have to consider what to do.

Have you talked with him about his housing situation?

MR. BELBAHRI: If I can just have a moment.

MR. BELBAHRI: Your Honor, he doesn't have a stable place that he's living, but he does have the ability to be able to keep the monitor charged by going to various locations.

THE COURT: Many people do it at the public library.

The other thing I want to explore -- I am considering releasing Mr. Vincent that is because he doesn't have -- these allegations are serious. I'm concerned. I also hear what you're saying about a moment of crisis, and I don't see a violent history in his past.

So sometimes when people are unhoused, they sort of stay in certain areas, or they frequent certain areas. Is near 501 Beale Street an area that Mr. Vincent is accustomed to being near?

MR. BELBAHRI: I apologize, Your Honor. Is that near Embarcadero?

THE COURT: It's -- it's --

(Off the record.)

THE DEFENDANT: Usually I know where I am. It's like 20 minutes away from there. So, walking distance.

THE COURT: Sort of south of Market on the -- close to

the water, I think.

MR. BELBAHRI: Your Honor, he does understand the fact that he does have to stay away from that specific area.

THE COURT: Submitted?

MR. BELBAHRI: Submitted.

MR. CHANG: Yes.

THE COURT: So the PSA recommends that I not release Mr. Vincent. That's based on a Step 2 Exclusion, and that's simply based on the charges.

The charges here are serious, but I also don't see anything in Mr. Vincent's history that suggests to me that he's going to commit a similar offense or be a public safety risk if I release him from custody.

I do -- I am intending to sign this stay-away order.

Any objection? It protects the victim as well as requires the defendant to stay away from 501 Beale Street.

MR. BELBAHRI: No objection.

THE COURT: This is going to be an ACM release rather than a GPS release at this time.

I have concerns about GPS release sufficient that I try not to do it unless I think it's really necessary to protect public safety. In view of Mr. Vincent's history, I don't make that finding here.

MR. CHANG: Your Honor, for the record, I've served counsel and his client copies of the protective order.

THE DEFENDANT: Thank you, Judge.

MR. BELBAHRI: Your Honor, could I take the waiver from Mr. Vincent?

THE COURT: 1 Go ahead. MR. BELBAHRI: Mr. Vincent, you have the right to have 2 a preliminary hearing within 10 court days of your 3 arraignment. I'd advise you to give up that right and 4 maintain your right to have a preliminary hearing within 60 5 6 calendar days of your arraignment. Is that something you would like to do? 7 Whatever you think's right. 8 THE DEFENDANT: 9 Just so that I am clear --THE COURT: 10 THE DEFENDANT: Yes. THE COURT: -- and that our record is clear, do you, 11 12 sir, give up your right to a preliminary hearing within 10 13 court days? 14 THE DEFENDANT: Yes, ma'am. THE COURT: We have a last day of October 15th. 15 16 MR. BELBAHRI: Does the Court want to short set this 17 case? 18 THE COURT: Give me one more moment. 19 What is the injury to the victim in this case, 20 Mr. Chang? 21 MR. CHANG: If I could have a moment, Your Honor. 22 THE COURT: What I have is just the police report that 23 says there was no visible sign of injury, and the victim 24 refused medical attention. 25 MR. CHANG: I see that as well in the fifth paragraph 26 down. 27 **THE COURT:** Just wondering if there's anything that I 28 am missing?
