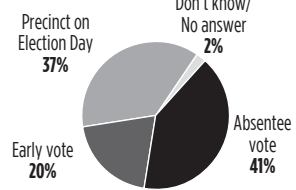

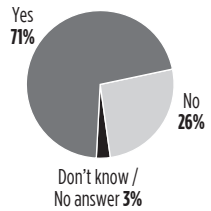

Method of voting

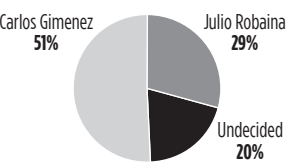


Have you received any automated telephone calls, or "robocalls", about the mayoral election?

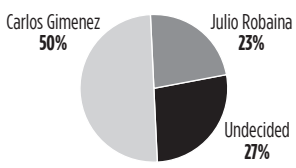

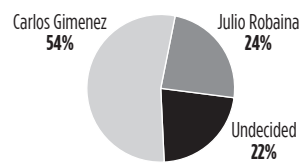

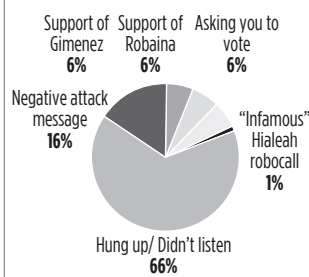

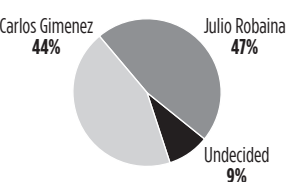


What do you remember about the message or the information that you received through this robocall?

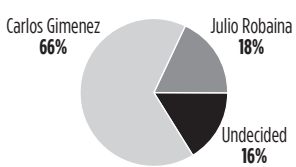


By race / ethnicity: If election were held today, whom would you vote for?

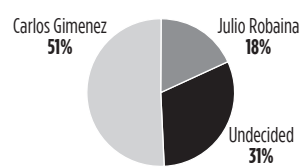
Hispanic



Non-hispanic white



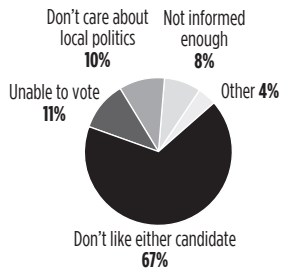

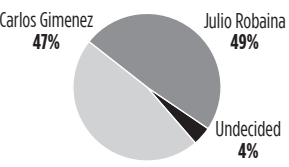
Asked of respondents who said they do not plan to vote:

Why are you not planning on voting in the June 28th election for mayor?

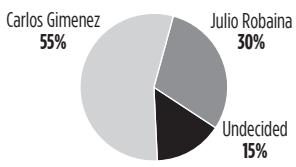


By voting method: If election were held today, whom would you vote for?

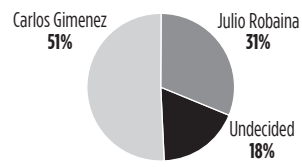
Absentee voters
