

Jessica Chastain stars as Bloom, whose dreams of an athletic career were cut short by a car accident. So she took another route to glory, albeit clandestine, as a gambling impresario, catering to Hollywood royalty, sports stars, business titans and finally, unbeknownst to her, members of the Russian mob. When glory turned to ignominy, she found a lone ally in criminal-defense lawyer Charlie Jaffey—played by the ever-watchable Idris Elba—who learned that there was much more to Molly than the tabloids led us to believe.

Supporting players Kevin Costner, Michael Cera, Chris O'Dowd and still others add the weight of their talent to Sorkin's debut as a feature director, which crackles with the intelligence and intensity of the dialogue he's known for.

Bucking Long Odds

In its review of Liyana, the Hollywood Reporter noted that the fable-within-adocumentary "reverberates with the hard-won celebratory ring of firsthand experience." One might think that the odds against it were long: not only does it deal with such grave subjects as AIDS, alcoholism, kidnapping and rape, but it does so from the viewpoint of children who live at an orphanage in the Southern African nation of Swaziland, where they're working with a storyteller to create a tale about a young girl's quest to save her twin brothers from kidnappers. The youngsters' creation comes to life in beautiful animated sequences that husband-and-wife directors Aaron and Amanda Kopp weave through their documentary footage to form a magical and moving whole. For this panel, moderator Robert Denerstein will take a case-study approach that allows the filmmakers to explain how the project originated, how it was funded, how it was shot and what challenges were overcome to produce the work that festival audiences are now seeing. This is a rare opportunity to trace the evolution of a film from beginning to completion.

The Changing World of Film Festivals

Like just about everything else in the world of cinema, film festivals have undergone major changes during the past several decades. The Denver Film Festival's 40th anniversary provides an excellent opportunity to look at their evolution. Panel moderator Robert Denerstein will lead the discussion, posing questions about the future of film festivals in the face of radical technological and cultural challenges.

The Syria Refugee Crisis in Year 7: Why It Matters for the World

The Syrian refugee crisis is widely viewed as the worst such crisis since World War II. This network, loosely known as the "artist-run film lab community," has grown considerably over the past decade and has led to the establishment of new labs across the globe; efforts to open an artist-run motion picture workspace right here in Denver are underway.

Politics and Freedom of Expression

In 1999, Colorado mother Jessica Gonzales experienced every parent's worst nightmare when her three young daughters were killed after being abducted by their father in violation of a restraining order. Devastated, Gonzales filed a lawsuit against the police, claiming they did not adequately enforce her restraining order despite her repeated calls for help that night—and wound up taking her case all the way to the US Supreme Court and an international human-rights tribunal in her determination to strengthen legal rights for domestic-violence victims and ensure her daughters didn't die in vain. Gonzales will join filmmakers Katya Maguire and April Hayes as well as Ruth Glenn, executive director of the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, as they discuss the hard truths of domestic violence in the 21st century.

The work about "creation, about the transformation of life into art and the loveliness of Florentine sunlight flooding through a window," Dargis wrote, is "so inviting and expansive that the experience is intensely pleasurable. Born in Massachusetts in 1949, Beavers moved to New York at the age of 16 and made his first film in 1967. From there he relocated to Europe with the influential avant-garde filmmaker Gregory Markopoulos. In the 1970s, they founded The Temenos, a private archive in Greece, where both filmmakers' works are preserved.

Beavers has had major retrospectives at the Whitney Museum, the Tate Museum, the Pacific Film Archives and the Oesterreichisches Filmmuseum. In 1999, he was honored by the National Society of Film Critics. He currently lives and works in Berlin and Massachusetts.

Robert Beavers will be presented with the 2017 Stan Brakhage Vision Award at 7:00pm on Sunday, November 5, at the Sie FilmCenter.
